Gordon H. DeFriese Awards

These annual awards honor Dr. Gordon H. DeFriese's 30-year distinguished career in research to improve the quality of lives of older North Carolinians, and especially his unwavering commitment to developing the careers of his colleagues. Recipients are a junior faculty/staff member and a doctoral student who demonstrate outstanding promise and a commitment to aging research.

Faculty Award: Anna Song Beeber, PhD, RN

Anna Song Beeber is an assistant professor at the UNC Chapel Hill School of Nursing, and Research Fellow at the Cecil G. Sheps Center for Health Services Research. Dr. Beeber received a BSN from Hartwick College, and a MSN (Adult and Geriatric Nurse Practitioner Programs) and PhD from the University of Pennsylvania School of Nursing. Her doctoral work focused on the process of enrollment in the Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE) from the perspective of patients, families, and staff (funded by the John A. Hartford Foundation Building Academic Geriatric Nursing Capacity Scholars Program and AHRQ). Dr. Beeber completed a post-doctoral fellowship at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Nursing, funded by the NINR Healthcare Quality and Patient Outcomes T32 and the John A. Hartford Foundation Building Academic Geriatric Nursing Capacity Fellowship program. Dr. Beeber is currently funded by The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill Building Interdisciplinary Research Careers in Women's Health Institutional K12 Program (BIRCWH) to conduct various projects examining and improving the quality of care in the Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly and residential care/assisted living. She plans to use her award to support a research assistant to further her research.

Doctoral Student Award Co-Winner: Ashley Leak, BSN, MSN

Ashley Leak received both her BSN and MSN at UNC Greensboro, and will graduate with her PhD in Nursing in May 2011. Her research and career interests involve working with aging adults with cancer, and her long term goal is to develop a program of research focused on complex problems of older adults with cancer. Ms. Leak's selection for both an Institutional National Research Service Award (NRSA) Predoctoral Fellowship for 2007-2009 and a John A. Hartford Building Academic Geriatric Nursing Capacity (BAGNC) Scholar for 2009-2011 has funded her four years of doctoral training. Her dissertation research is a secondary data analysis focused on testing a Cancer Survivor Adaptation model with older non-Hodgkin lymphoma (NHL) patients to identify factors that moderate or mediate their quality of life. She will receive a UNC Interdisciplinary Certificate in Aging upon graduation and was recently selected as a member of the American Nurses Credentialing Center as a Content Expert Panel for Gerontological Nurses for a 4 year term. After completing her PhD in 2011, Ms. Leak will pursue post doctoral training and plans a career as a gero-oncology nurse scientist.

Doctoral Student Award Co-Winner: Tiffany Washington, BA, MSW

Tiffany Washington obtained her BA in Communication Studies at UNC Chapel Hill and her MSW at both North Carolina A&T University and UNC Greensboro. She is currently working on obtaining her PhD in social work at UNC Chapel Hill where she is a predoctoral fellow in the Carolina Program in Health and Aging Research (CPHAR). Ms. Washington's research interests include disease self-management among older adults with chronic kidney disease, influence of family and social support on older adult chronic illness self-management, older adult perceived health competence, and illness perceptions. She teaches an undergraduate service-learning course and incorporates aging-related content throughout the semester. Ms. Washington has held assistantships at both the Cecil G. Sheps Center for Health Services Research and the Center for Aging Research and Educational Guidance. She has fulfilled three aging fellowships: the Hartford Pre-Dissertation fellowship, the Summer Training on Aging Research Topics in Mental Health fellowship, and the Summer Training Workshop on African American Aging Research fellowship, all of which have helped her form a foundation for aging research. Ms. Washington intends to use her award to support her dissertation research and data collection.

American Indian Aging Policy and Research

Margaret Moss, PhD, JD, RN, FAAN, Yale University School of Nursing



Margaret Moss is Associate Professor and Director of the Nursing Management, Policy, and Leadership Specialty at Yale University School of Nursing. Dr. Moss received her PhD in Nursing from the University of Texas at Houston Health Sciences Center in 2000 and subsequently received a distinguished alumni award in 2002. She is one of only 17 doctorally-prepared American Indian nurses in the country and the only one to focus solely on aging. Dr. Moss is an enrolled member of the Three Affiliated Tribes of North Dakota: The Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara Nation. She completed a two-year post-doctoral fellowship at the University of Colorado's Native Elder Research Center, a Resource Center for Minority Aging Research. Concurrently, she entered and completed law school and received her Juris Doctorate from Hamline University School of Law in Saint Paul, Minn. She is the first and only American Indian to hold both nursing and juris doctorates. In 2008, Dr. Moss was named a Robert Wood Johnson Health Policy Fellow, and staffed the Senate Special Committee on Aging under the ranking Senators Mel Martinez and Bob Corker. She was inducted as a Fellow into the American Academy of Nursing in 2008.
